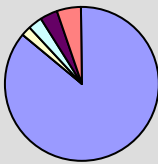

### Student Population

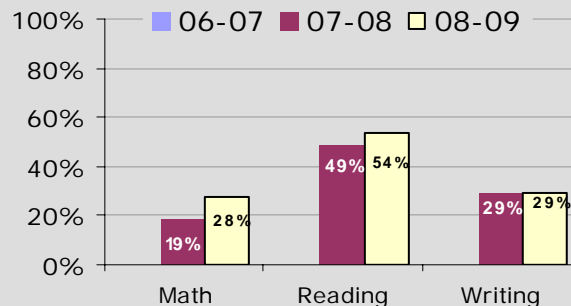
