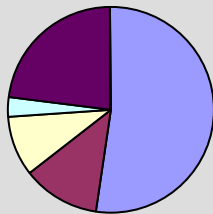

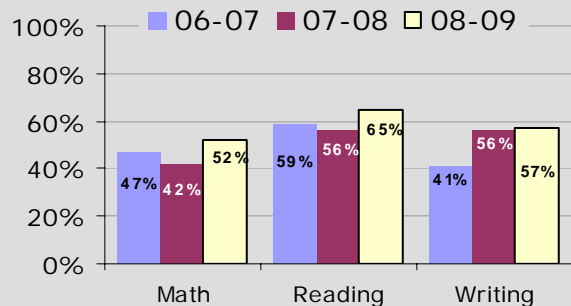

A first for Oregon

In September 2004, Marshall High School, in outer Southeast Portland, became one of the first large high schools in Oregon to convert into autonomous, small schools. Marshall's conversion was in direct response to challenges it faced: only 25 percent of students met 10th grade benchmarks in math and reading, and the school's poor reputation in the community resulted in persistent decreases in enrollment. At Marshall, close to 60 percent of students are from low-income families and almost 40 percent are students of color. When planning the three schools, staff focused on creating a plan to turn student achievement around. Marshall's three autonomous schools offer a rigorous, personalized college preparatory curriculum each with a unique educational approach. Of the three original academies, BizTech Academy and Renaissance Arts Academy continue to partner with E3 to continue improving their work.
